



Vivaldi Jean-Marie, Ph.D is a professor of Philosophy at the City University of New York and holds an ongoing appointment as an adjunct Professor of Philosophy at the Institute for Research in African-American Studies at Columbia University.

He is the author of four books: *Vodou Cosmology and the Haitian Revolution in the Enlightenment Ideals of Kant and Hegel* (University of the West Indies Press, 2018), *Reflections on Jean Améry: Torture, Resentment, and Homelessness as the Mind's Limits* (Palgrave MacMillan, 2018), *Kierkegaard: History and Eternal Happiness* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2008), and *Fanon: Collective Ethics and Humanism* (Peter Lang, 2007). He has also published peer-reviewed articles in *Gnosis*, *The Western Journal of Black Studies*, *Souls*, and the *CLR James Journal*.

He was a Scholar-in-Residence at Hertford College, University of Oxford during Summer 2015. Vivaldi Jean-Marie received his Ph.D. in Philosophy from the New School for Social Research. He is currently working on a book manuscript, *Rastafari Cosmology and the Ethos of Blackness*.
